IT'S A MATTER OF (CO-OP!) PRINCIPLES



ACE Hardware, State Farm, REI, Land O'Lakes and Daviess-Martin County REMC all have something in common: we're all cooperatives.


We may be in different industries, but we all share a passion for serving our members and helping our communities to thrive. In fact, all cooperatives adhere to the same set of seven principles that reflect our core values of honesty, transparency, equity, inclusiveness and service to the greater community good. October is National Co-op Month, so this is the perfect time to reflect on these principles that have stood the test of time but also provide a framework for the future. Let's take a look at the first three cooperative principles.

VOLUNTARY AND OPEN MEMBERSHIP

Just like all co-ops, DMREMC was created out of necessity to meet a need that would have been otherwise unmet in our community. So in 1939, a group of neighbors banded together and organized our electric co-op so everyone in our community could benefit. For a modest membership fee to the co-op, any farmer could get electricity brought to his farm. Neighbors came together to tackle a problem that they all had but couldn't solve alone. They worked together for the benefit of the whole community, and the newly established electric lines helped power economic opportunity in our community.

While this history may be forgotten, key parts of that heritage remain — the focus on our mission and serving the greater good. In this, we include everyone to

MFMBFRS' FCONOMIC PARTICIPATION

As a utility, our mission is to provide safe, reliable and affordable energy to our members. But as a co-op, we are also motivated by service to the community, rather than profits. Members contribute equitably to, and democratically control, the capital of DMREMC.

Because we are guided by seven cooperative principles, it's not just about dollars - it's about opportunity for all and being fair when engaging with our members. The cooperative way is a values-based business model.

DMREMC is a reflection of our local community and its evolving needs. We view our role as a catalyst for good and making our corner of the world a better place, with the seventh co-op principle, "concern for community."

Mndaimed CAPITAL CREDITS



It pays to be a co-op member! Do we owe you money?

One of the benefits of being a member is patronage capital credits. Patronage capital credits come from margins, or money left over at the end of the year after all operating costs and expenses have been paid. These margins are allocated to each member's capital credit account based on how much electricity the member purchased that year.

Each year the board of directors determines if the cooperative is financially able to pay prior years' capital credits back to the members. When so approved, the cooperative refunds designated prior year's capital credits to the members who used electricity during the designated years.

Even if you move and are no longer a member of the cooperative, the capital credits remain in your account. Be sure to update your mailing address with Daviess-Martin County REMC if you move so we can send future capital credit checks to the correct address.

There is an extensive amount of unclaimed capital credits and the REMC is taking steps to distribute capital credits to individuals who were members of the cooperative for the years specified as 2011 through 2019.

Interested individuals should review the unclaimed capital credits list and call the REMC office during normal weekday business hours at 1-800-7627362 to gather details on the owner's name and amount of owner's interest. A request for retirement of capital credits will need to be filled out in the claim form link.

If said credits are not duly claimed within sixty (60) days between Sept. 1 – Oct. 31, 2021, the sum owing by

1 – Oct. 31, 2021, the sum owing by the cooperative to any member shall be treated as donated cash. Current active members will receive a bill credit for unclaimed prior years retirement amounts after the 60-day period.

Don't be spooked by electricity when decorating this Halloween

It's fun to make your home look spooky at Halloween, and many enjoy decorating for trick-ortreaters just as much as they enjoy decking the halls for Christmas.

Make sure that all decorations used outdoors are marked for "outdoor use."

Don't put decorations on or around electrical equipment such as transformer boxes or power poles.

Any electrical decoration used outside should be plugged into an outlet with a ground-fault circuit interrupter (GFCI).

HALLOWEEN SAFETY TIPS



WALK SAFELY

Cross the street at corners, using traffic signals and crosswalks.

Always walk on sidewalks or paths. If there are no sidewalks, walk facing traffic as far to the left as possible.



TRICK OR TREAT **WITH AN ADULT**

Children under the age of 12 should not be alone at night without adult supervision.



KEEP COSTUMES CREATIVE AND SAFE

Decorate costumes and bags with reflective tape or stickers and, if possible, choose light colors. Have kids carry glow sticks or flashlights to help them be seen by drivers.



DRIVE EXTRA SAFELY ON HALLOWEEN

Drive slowly, anticipate heavy pedestrian traffic and turn your headlights on earlier in the day to spot children from greater distances.
